

## DIY: Weebly Citations

For this research project, you will need to cite your sources and input them on your website. This document will teach you how to format your sources in MLA style and your “Works Cited” section on your website.

### I. Formatting Citations (from OWL at Purdue)

When deciding how to cite your source, start by consulting the list of core elements. These are the general pieces of information that MLA suggests including in each Works Cited entry. In your citation, the elements should be listed in the following order:

1. Author.
2. Title of source.
3. Title of container,
4. Other contributors,
5. Version,
6. Number,
7. Publisher,
8. Publication date,
9. Location,
10. Access Date (online sources)

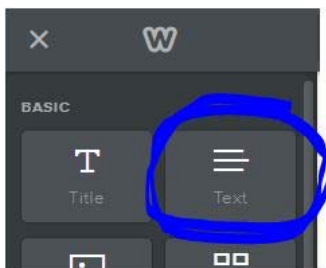

Each element should be followed by the punctuation mark shown on the list above. Punctuation is simple (just commas and periods separate the elements), and information about the source is kept to the basics. DO NOT COLOR CODE CITATIONS. Since most of your sources will be online, you will need to include the date you accessed the site.

### II. Weebly Input

Follow the steps below to input citations on your website. Each team member must input their own sources on their own tabs. You must include a MINIMUM of four sources per tab.

1. On the BUILD menu, click the TEXT box.



2. Drag it and drop it at the bottom of your tab.

3. Type in your citation.

4. On the Text Option menu (pops up when editing text in a Text Box), select the Numbered List button.
